WORD

FIRST READING: Daniel 7:9-10, 13-14

L: A reading from Daniel.

To the community for whom this passage was written, it seemed as though the oppression they were experiencing would never end. Daniel's message is: It shall end. The Ancient One, who is judge, will call all nations to account and will give dominion to "one like a human being," the Messiah.

⁹As I watched, thrones were set in place, and an Ancient One took his throne, his clothing was white as snow, and the hair of his head like pure wool; his throne was fiery flames, and its wheels were burning fire.

¹⁰A stream of fire issued and flowed out from his presence.

A thousand thousands served him, and ten thousand times ten thousand stood attending him.

The court sat in judgment, and the books were opened.

¹³As I watched in the night visions,

I saw one like a human being coming with the clouds of heaven.

GOSPEL: John 18:33-37

In John's gospel, the story of Jesus and Pilate presents two different ways of exercising power: through force or with love.

³³Pilate entered the headquarters again, summoned Jesus, and asked him, "Are you the King of the Jews?" ³⁴Jesus answered, "Do you ask this on your own, or did others tell you about me?" ³⁵Pilate replied, "I am not a Jew, am I? Your own nation and the chief priests have handed you over to me. What have you done?" ³⁶Jesus answered, "My kingdom is not from this world. If my kingdom were from this world, my followers would be fighting to keep me from being handed over to the Jews. But as it is, my kingdom is not from here." ³⁷Pilate asked him, "So you are a king?" Jesus answered, "You say that I am a king. For this I was born, and for this I came into the world, to testify to the truth. Everyone who belongs to the truth listens to my voice."

A: God, you sent your Son Jesus to make us into your own people, set free to serve you. We pray for people who serve the well-being of others, especially ministries in our community (*local social ministries or agencies may be named*). Renew them in their work. God, in your mercy,

hear our prayer.

A: God, you sent your Son Jesus to rule in all times and places. We pray for the friends of our congregation who are unable to join our worship in person and for all who are sick and suffering (*especially*)...

healing and comfort for **Taylor (Evenson)**, **Phyllis** (Vergenz), **Lila** (Spike), **Caleb** (Wipperfurth), **Sara** (Depies) **and Jeff** (Walheim) Join their prayers with ours and unite them with us in the body of Christ. God, in your mercy,

Bible Study/Faith Five Week 9 – Of Tents and Kings

- 1. Share or think about your highs and lows.
- 2. Our Bible verse is Joshua 24:15 "Choose this day whom you will serve, whether the gods your ancestors served in the region beyond the River or the gods of the Amorites in whose land you are living; but as for me and my household, we will serve the Lord."
- 3. Think about or discuss: Joshua becomes the leader after Moses. The people have been in the wilderness for a generation. They are now ready to go into the promised land to claim the promise of a land of their own. That promise was given to Abraham some 500 years earlier. Unfortunately, the land was already occupied by other people and nations. There were a series of bloody wars before the people were able to settle in the land. Why do you think that a series of bloody wars is a part of our Bible? What questions does it bring up for you? Our confirmation book was quite clear about how we should think about this: "Ask God about this when you get to heaven."

The people settled the land and were joined in a loose confederation of tribes. In the Book of Judges, we read about a cycle that was repeated and repeated: the people turned away from God, they cry out to God for rescue, and God raised up a judge to rescue the people (such as Deborah, Gideon, and Samson). How do our actions sometimes get us in trouble? How do we handle it?

The people of Israel were just like us. They sometimes wanted what others had. They wanted a king, just like other nations. How do you think God felt about that idea? What are the pros and cons of having a king to rule over you?

- 4. Pray for the needs of others, for our church, community, and world.
- 5. Our blessing is from Faith Inkubators: "(Name), child of God, may you know that God goes with you this day."

EKLC In-Person Worship Guidelines Updated 11/1/2021

Updated 11/1/2021 The Public Health Madison & Dane County will continue to require all individuals aged two and older to wear a mask while in any indoor space open to the public.
